All abstracts will be reviewed by the ISFH Scientific Committee; authors will be informed before the end of June whether their abstract has been accepted and whether their presentation will be oral or by poster.

#### Congress Proceedings

The publisher will contact authors directly regarding the submission of manuscripts. All manuscripts not submitted to the publisher must be submitted to the Congress Secretariat by August 20 to be included in the Congress proceedings.

#### Presentations

Abstracts selected for oral presentation will be presented lecture style followed by a short question period. The Congress Center will have facilities for the projection of standard 35mm slides and overhead transparencies; LCD facilities also will be available. Most abstracts will be presented as posters; posters will be displayed in the exhibit area Wednesday through Friday. Authors are to be present at their poster during the viewing periods on one of the three days of display.

#### Dining Out

#### Weather

August is one of the best times to visit San Francisco. There is little chance of rain and the weather is moderate with typical daytime temperatures about 68 °F (20 °C). Evenings can be cool and it is advisable to carry a coat or sweater. This weather pattern is characteristic for the Northern California coastal region, from Carmel and Monterey south of San Francisco to the Mendocino coast to the north. The weather inland is typically warmer by 10-20 °F.

# Sight-seeing and Vacation Options in Northern California

Northern California offers many opportunities for vacation travel and sight-seeing. Monterey, home to Cannery Row and the Monterey Bay Aquarium, is located about 100 miles south of San Francisco. The region north of San Francisco is known for its rugged coast line and redwood groves. To the north of San Francisco and somewhat inland is the heart of California wine country, the Napa and Sonoma valleys. Yosemite National Park and Lake Tahoe are located in the Sierra Nevada mountain range, about 200 miles to the east. California's Gold Rush country is located in the foothills of the Sierras. Because some areas, such as Yosemite National Park, are in high demand, it is advisable to book accommodations early.
